

My Season's Greetings and Happy Holidays To The Fellow FISTS Members.

In this year 2006, I put back the old vertical wire antenna and radials with the ICOM AH-4 tuner, after operating a vertical dipole for the 20m band from May 2005 to March 2006 (see November and December 2005 editions of MorsEAsia for the details). That dipole earned me an award of CQ WW CW 2005 Contest (Single-op 20m Low-power JA 3rd place), K7C on September 2005, and 3Y0X on February 2006.

My activity on ham radio this year got largely reduced, due to more work assignments and many business trips. I again realized CW was *the most efficient and effective* mode to enjoy, even at the bottom of the solar cycle.

This year I have added a passive audio filter unit of 900Hz 5th-order Butterworth LPF and 440Hz + 200Hz 2-pole BPF for the headphone output of my IC-706mkIIG. I keep this filter attached most of the time I'm on the air because over 90% of my operation is in CW. I also installed a 250Hz Xtal CW filter on the IC-706mkIIG, for a quieter listening environment. The Xtal filter works very well, especially for listening to the weak-signal stations.

My keying system is minimal using Palm Radio Mini-Paddle and Idiom Press CMOS-4 keyer with the headphones. Iput the system away when I do other things, and put it back on the desk when I operate.


Working 5A7A on November 2006 gave me a great experience on operating in the early morning, though this is not recommended for all because you risk your health:-)

This is my operating desk, full of miscellaneous objects. The paddle and the keyer are on the right end of the desk. The IC-706mkIIG controller is small enough and fits very well in front of the computer

keyboard.



Recently I decided to put the radio system under a metal rack (Home ERECTA of 60cm width x 30cm height x 35cm depth), so that I can put more equipments on the limited space. The audio filter unit is located at the lower-center part of the rack in a plastic case under the disconnected keyer and paddle, besides IC-706MKIIG and DM-330MV power supply.


