
YASU, JH2HTQ, #15166

My favorite HF rigs are below.

- 1. MIZUHO QP-7 (TX) + VFO \leftrightarrow TRIO JR-599 (RX) is 1 W QRP line.
- 2. KIDADENSHI RX7-DX (RX) ↔ MIZUHO QP-7 (TX)/XTAL (5ch.) ↔ 10 W power amplifier is the most cheap 10 W line in the world. This homemade rig is made using some units of radio kit makers. RX and power amplifier is Kida Engineering Manufacture. RX was needed 7 MHz pre-amp and AF-DSP filter. TX is MIZUHO TUSHIN. XTAL is AZUMA MUSEN. Semi break-in unit was made by own hand. Please look at the TX circuit diagram. Operating is very easy, because parts are simple and little. It's special unit for CW. So it's low cost. Enough it's working to QSO for 2000 km away.
- 3. TRIO TS-820V (10 W) is also very old-rig.





I was able to exchange emails with Nao in the weeks before he arrived, and we tried a few times to achieve a QSO on 15 or 20m. Unfortunately the best the bands could offer was a brief exchange of call signs at 339 RST so we had to wait patiently until we could meet in person.

Melbourne is a city with many cultures and cuisines blending into the fabric of the city, and as this was the first visit for Nao to Australia, I though we should try some food you can't find in Hyogo, but represents something of modern Australian life. My choice was an inner city restaurant called Kanzaman, serving traditional Lebanese food. The kangaroos are particularly interesting as some are quite tame and with supervision from a zookeeper you can enter their enclosure and feed them by hand. So Nao and Derek were able to meet 'Skippy' the Bush Kangaroo (do you know the TV show?).


