
## YASU, JH2HTQ, #15166



His signal became loud and 599 at peak with QSB. My antenna was 2ele Quad. He told that he worked in QRP by K1 with 3 watts into fish rod whip antenna from the beach and could see a beautiful sunset there. It was so amazing that 2way QRP over 6,000 km made me to feel thrilling and I could imagine clearly a great sunset on the beach. Hard to have such an unforgettable QSO again.

After a long QRT period of over 20 years, I resumed Ham radio in Nov. 2011. Just after my restart of Ham life, I was enjoying CW QSO in 599BK and rubber stamp style, and that was interesting enough because I was just a beginner of CW. As I am getting used to such QSO, I started feeling I would like to enjoy CW QSO more.

One day on 2-meter band, I found a station who was sending CQ in QOD1 (English) repeatedly. In Japan on 2-meter band, QOD6 (Japanese Code) Morse is quite major and CW QSO in QOD1 is rare except for contests, so it looked he had hard time in finding stations who would work with him. (Of course, I did not know QOD6 at this time.) I called him and worked with him in rubber-stamp style, then I tried to send some personal matters and so on in English and he replied accordingly. In this way, a long CW chat began in very simple English under a stable and low-noise condition thanks to 2-meter band. Maybe it lasted for about an hour. My heart beat so fast and I felt very thirsty from the excitement of the first CW chat in English in my life. Then after, whenever I found him on 2-meter band, I called him and enjoyed CW chat so often.

In this way, I have become very interested in chat and conversational style QSO by CW.

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## A GIFT FROM A PERSON I KNOW ONLY HIS CODE, TAK, JS1QIZ, #15150

I had a QSO with JK8FYW, Kanazawa-san in June 2000. We have been in contact for several years but only in CW and we did not know even what kind of voice the person behind the key has. Since I got married several months before this QSO, I casually mentioned about it in our conversation using Morse code. My signal report from him was 419.

To my surprise, a big envelop was sent to me from him a few day later, in which a big photo of Hakodate city view was included as a gift. Several booklets were also included with a greeting message.

My wife could never believe that a person who even does not know my voice sent me a greeting message with the gift. I explained her that this is the ham communication,



but I myself did not have even a slightest idea about receiving this kind of gift after the 419 QSO.

Kanazawa-san was a professional radio operator of commercial vessels for decades and told me about many memorable QSOs (including distress ones) in our Morse communications which took places before and after this QSO. However, to me, this June 2000 QSO is the most memorable one.
